Dr. Jerry Wallace Will Talk About Rosedale Farms

On November 21, Dr. Jerry Wallace, the DACHS vice president, will present "The Ideal Spot to Live is in the Valley" -- Rosedale Farms and the Making of an El Paso Midcentury Neighborhood, at the monthly talk. The presentation will be in the Good Samaritan auditorium at 3011 Buena Vida Cir. and will start at 7 p.m. It is free and open to the public. The Zoom invitation will come in an email.

In 1922, Winchester Cooley converted his land into a modern subdivision calling it Rosedale Farms and by 1929 El Paso's newest neighborhood had over 200 one-to-three acre lots. Near the end of the 1920s, Cooley partnered with a local real estate agent M.L. Cadwallader and local developer Roy W. Carey, branding the new neighborhood as "The Ideal Spot to Live...."

What Cooley, Cadwallader and Carey did was create a rural refuge for El Pasoans in a rapidly expanding cityscape. In the early 1930s, new branding and marketing schemes billed Rosedale Farms as an experiment of farm living in the city.

The community, now centrally located in El Paso continues to operate as an oasis for its residents. This presentation will examine Rosedale Farms over a fifty-year period, 1922-1972 and explore architectural styles and the neighborhood's midcentury identity.

Jerry Wallace is the Director of the Public History program at NMSU. His forthcoming book examines the Trost & Trost architectural firm from El Paso that designed many prominent structures in west Texas, southern New Mexico and beyond.

Two Out Of Three Photo Exhibits Still Available Downtown

In October, three great photo exhibits were showing at the Branigan Cultural Center and the Las Cruces Art Museum. The Emmitt Booher display of White Sands National Park photos has packed up and is gone. The other two are still there.

First, in the Branigan, is a historian and photographer's delight. The exhibit is "The Ballard Photo Studio: A Portrait of Community," and features more than 200 portraits and other photographic works by Las Cruces photographer Jim Ballard.

These works offer a snapshot of the Mesilla Valley community between 1930 and 1950. The images are from the Ballard Photo Studio collection at the NMSU Library Archives. The exhibit runs through Saturday, February 15, 2025.


Jim Ballard operated his photo studio on Main Street, where he created portraits of more than 5,000 Mesilla Valley residents. If you know anything about our local history, you will find portraits of many of the people behind the names you know who shaped the Mesilla Valley. Even Lt. Col. Harold Turner, the first commander of White Sands Proving Ground sat for a Ballard portrait.

It is an intriguing and simple display that sucks you in. These are just people after all, but they were very real and you will find yourself wondering about them and what kind of life they each led.

Using a large-format camera on a tripod, Ballard captured his subjects on 5×7-inch negatives, resulting in clear, high-resolution images. The NMSU Library Archive holds over 25,000 portrait negatives from the Ballard Photo Studio, with more than 200 images selected for this exhibit. Additionally, Ballard photographed area businesses and community events, producing roughly 4,000 more negatives, which are also preserved by the Library Archives.

The other exhibit is a remarkable retrospective featuring 45 stunning large-format, black-and-white photographic prints, spanning over 50 years of Clyde Butcher's career. This exhibit will only be up through the end of December.

Stinking Springs is near Taiban, NM and is where Pat Garrett's posse caught up with Billy the Kid and his small gang on Dec. 23, 1880. In March 1881, Billy was then transported to Mesilla where he was convicted of murder and ordered to hang in Lincoln.

The BTK Historical Coalition is dedicated to educating the public and advancing research related to Billy the Kid and the historical sites, figures, and documents connected to his life.
