Jim Eckles To Talk About Space Activities

Jim Eckles will speak at the October DACHS meeting on Oct. 17 at 7 p.m. in the auditorium at the Good Samaritan. His topic will be a history of Space-related activities at White Sands Missile Range. The meeting is free and open to the public.

Many know the Space Shuttle Columbia landed at White Sands in 1982 but did you know most astronaut pilot training for the entire length of the Shuttle program was done at WSMR? German V-2 rockets were the first vehicles capable of sending instruments, cameras and experiments to the edge of Space. Those flights were conducted at WSMR from 1946 to 1951. Most don't know that the V-2s were the start of the "sounding rocket" program at White Sands which continues today. NASA-sponsored rockets continue to take university and government astronomy instruments 100 to 200 miles straight up over southern New Mexico. Jim will tell you how that old grade-school lesson about having 3 things for a fire has been modified because

of some NASA sounding rocket flights.

He will also talk about WSMR's proposal in the 1960s for launching NASA's Apollo moon rockets from a pad area just a couple of miles north of Organ, NM. Las Cruces residents could have watched the moon launches from their homes.

Interestingly, there was also a proposal at that time to land the Apollo astronauts at White Sands on their return from the moon. The spot picked out was later used for the Space Shuttle runways and is currently being used by Boeing and their troubled Starliner vehicle

Jim worked at the White Sands Public Affairs Office for 30 years. He was there when

Columbia landed and has seen his fair share of sounding rocket launches.

The auditorium is at 3011 Buena Vida Circle. The lecture will be available on Zoom and invitations will go out a few days prior.





Border Archives Bazaar Will Be Saturday, Oct. 19 At Farm & Ranch


Lovers of borderland history will have a chance to see original documents, maps, photographs and other historical materials at the Border Archives Bazaar Saturday, October 19, 10am to 4pm at the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum in Las Cruces. Twenty archives from southern New Mexico and west Texas will showcase their materials from their holdings at the event, celebrating borderland cultures and Southwest history.

"This is a great chance for the public to see first-hand letters of famed lawman Pat Garrett, vintage 19th century photographs of El Paso and Las Cruces, original historical maps of the region, and so much more," said DACHS president Dennis Daily, who works with the Border Regional Archives Group (BRAG) to sponsor the event.

"The event is kind of a cross between *Antiques Roadshow* and *History Detectives*," said Daily. "In addition to the original historical materials, there will be two panels of presentations on topics related to borderland history." Presenters will cover early Mesilla history, Black communities in the borderlands, and New Mexico's Judaic history, among other topics.

The free public event highlights American

Dave Moeller's Review Of The Three-Cornered War - A War For The West

THE THREE-CORNERED WAR; The Union, the Confederacy, and Native Peoples in the Fight for the West, by Megan Kate Nelson, 2020.

As an amateur military historian, I am very busy researching events occurring in the New Mexico-Arizona area from 1846-1900. This slice of time encompasses the Mexican-American War, the Civil War, and the Indian Wars. For example, when visiting Scotland, one could not throw a stone without hitting a site of historical significance. I humbly submit this publication is a great start point to understand the conflict between the Native Americans and soldier-settlers that traversed and encroached upon their boundless ancestral homeland. This book is seconded only by Dr Hutton's, *The Apache Wars*, in my opinion.

The publication is an easy read. The author brought the story to me through the experiences of known (and unknown by me) military, civilian, and Native American personalities rather than just crucial events. She accomplished her goal by spending countless hours reading letters, reports, and

transcripts of these individuals in a specific block of time, 1861-1868. From the Confederate occupation to the abandonment of the Bosque Redondo. One or more of the selected individuals leads us through by relating their own trials and tribulations, accomplishments and failures. The main personalities also bring to light some people who were by their side, and just as instrumental to the telling of the story. Because I grew to know the person of each chapter, I could not help but become immersed in that block of time.

I was able to enjoy the book because I could read either a whole chapter or a specific piece(s) within the chapter. Like with Lego blocks I was able to build and retain the parts of the entire story to conclusion with ease. I now have a better understanding of the events of the past and their impact up to the present due to their portrayal by actual personalities of the time.

There are four easy to follow maps that assist the reader in keeping to the timeline of events. There are portraits of most of the people involved, as well.
